- **Re:** Clarification of the Timeframe of Documentation of Means-Tested Benefits for Determining Eligibility in NYS Opportunity Programs (Education Law § 6451 and 6452)

This memorandum aims to clarify how means-tested benefits are to be considered in the economic eligibility screening process for **NYS Opportunity Program students** (Education Law § 6451 and 6452) in alignment with the Federal Student Aid (FSA) Handbook and the FAFSA Simplification Act. According to <u>Federal Student Aid</u>, "a means-tested benefit is a public benefit where the granting agency considers your income and resources for purposes of determining your eligibility for the program" (refer to your OP Sector Guidelines/RFP regarding acceptable documentation, e.g., SSI and TANF).

According to the FSA Handbook, institutions may consider benefits received in either the base year (the prior-prior year) or the year immediately preceding the FAFSA application (the prior year) for this determination. Further, the 2024-25 FAFSA simplification guidance dictates that the Student Aid Index (SAI) now accounts for families receiving means-tested benefits at any time during the prior two years.

Therefore, eligible documentation of means-tested benefits received by the family within the past two-years can be used when evaluating economic eligibility for NYS Opportunity Programs (i.e., EOP, SEEK/CD, and HEOP).

Institutions are encouraged to implement this guidance to align with the FAFSA Simplification Act and its related reforms, and the definitions listed in Education Law § 6451 and 6452. These efforts underscore a commitment to serving students with a historical economic disadvantage in accessing educational opportunities.
