Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2023 and 2022

1. Organization and Tax Status

Math, Engineering, and Science Academy (MESA) Charter High School (the "School") is a New York State, not-for-profit educational corporation that was incorporated to operate a Charter School pursuant to Article 56 of the Education Law of the State of New York. The School was granted a provisional charter on December 11, 2012 valid for a term of five years and renewable upon expiration by the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. On June 12, 2023, the charter was renewed for an additional five years expiring on June 30, 2028. The School's mission is to provide ninth to twelfth grade students with a rigorous education that equips each student with the ability to succeed in life and in college. The School serves students living in Bushwick and the surrounding communities in Brooklyn, New York. Classes commenced in August 2013 and the School provided education to approximately 488 students in the ninth through twelfth grades during the 2022-2023 academic year.

The School has an agreement with the New York City Department of Education ("NYCDOE") to share public school space at no annual cost. The School occupies approximately 20,880 square feet on two floors of a public school building. The School also shares the gymnasium, auditorium and cafeteria with two public schools, of which the School's share is approximately 11,000 square feet. The School is not responsible for rent, utilities, custodial services, and school safety services other than those required for days and times the School operates outside of the traditional NYCDOE schedule. The School was unable to determine a value for the contributed space and related services and did not record any value for use of donated facilities and services.

The New York City Department of Education provides free lunches directly to some of the School's students. Such costs are not included in these financial statements. The School covers the cost of lunches for children not entitled to the free lunches. The Office of Pupil Transportation provides free transportation to some of the students.

Except for taxes that may be due for unrelated business income, the School is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and from state and local income taxes under comparable laws.

On October 12, 2023, the SUNY Board of Trustees' Charter Schools Committee discussed and unanimously approved a resolution authorizing the establishment of Math, Engineering, and Science Academy (MESA) Charter High School 2. The second Charter School is expected to open in the fall of 2025.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation and Use of Estimates

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP"), which requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Net Assets Presentation

Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into net asset categories established according to nature and purpose as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general support of the School's operations and not subject to donor or grantor restrictions. Net assets without donor restrictions may be used at the discretion of the School's management and Board of Trustees.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor or grantor imposed restrictions for specific activities of the School or to be used at some future date. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Restricted Cash

Under the provisions of its charter, the School established an escrow account to pay for legal and audit expenses that would be associated with a dissolution, should it occur.

Property and Equipment

The School follows the practice of capitalizing all expenditures for property and equipment with costs in excess of \$1,000. Leasehold improvements are amortized over the shorter of the term of the lease, inclusive of all renewal periods, which are reasonably assured, or the estimated useful life of the asset, and a useful life of three to five years. Purchased property and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition. Minor costs of maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred. All property and equipment purchased with government funding is capitalized, unless the government agency retains legal title to such assets, in which case it is expensed as incurred.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Property and Equipment (continued)

Depreciation and amortization is recognized on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of such assets as follows:

Property and equipment are reviewed for impairment if the use of the asset significantly changes or another indicator of possible impairment is identified. If the carrying amount for the asset is not recoverable, the asset is written down to its fair value. There were no asset impairments for the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022.

Refundable Advances

The School records certain government operating revenue as refundable advances until related services are performed, at which time they are recognized as revenue.

Revenue and Support

Revenue from the state and local governments resulting from the School's charter status and based on the number of students enrolled is recorded when services are performed in accordance with the charter agreement. Federal and other state and local funds are recorded when expenditures are incurred and billable to the government agency.

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the School that is, in substance, unconditional. Grants and other contributions of cash are reported as net assets with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations. Restricted contributions and grants that are made to support the School's current year activities are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of donation.

Functional Expense Allocation

The majority of expenses can generally be directly identified with the program or supporting service to which they relate and are charged accordingly. Other expenses such as personnel services costs, fringe benefits and payroll taxes, other purchased, professional, consulting services and student and staff recruitment have been allocated among program and supporting services classifications on the basis of periodic time and expense studies and other basis as determined by management of the School to be appropriate.

Reclassification

Certain 2022 accounts have been reclassified to conform to 2023 financial statements presentation.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2023 and 2022

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes

The School recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not to be sustained. Management has determined that the School had no uncertain tax positions that would require financial statement recognition or disclosure. The School is no longer subject to examinations by the applicable taxing jurisdictions for years prior to June 30, 2020.

Subsequent Events Evaluation by Management

Management has evaluated subsequent events for disclosure and/or recognition in the financial statements through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, which date is October 24, 2023.

3. Grants and Contracts Receivable

Grants and contracts receivable consist of federal, state, city entitlements and grants and a foundation grant. The School expects to collect these receivables within one year. Management has assessed the need for an allowance for doubtful accounts and has determined that such an allowance is not necessary.

7. Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the School to concentrations of credit and market risk consist principally of cash on deposit with financial institutions, which from time to time may exceed the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") limit. The School does not believe that a significant risk of loss due to the failure of a financial institution presently exists. At June 30, 2023 and 2022, approximately \$5,304,000 and \$4,900,000 of cash was maintained with an institution in excess of FDIC limits.

8. Concentration of Revenue and Support

The School receives a substantial portion of its revenue and support from the New York City Department of Education. For the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, the School received approximately 83% and 76% of its total revenue and support from the New York City Department of Education. If the charter school laws were modified, reducing or eliminating these revenues, the School's finances could be materially adversely affected.

9. Employee Benefit Plan

The School maintains a pension plan qualified under Internal Revenue Code 401(k), for the benefit of its eligible employees. Under the plan, the School matched up to 4% of the employees' salary. Total employer match for the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022 amounted to \$210,474 and \$170,184.

10. Contingency

Certain grants and contracts may be subject to audit by the funding sources. Such audits might result in disallowances of costs submitted for reimbursement. Management is of the opinion that such cost disallowances, if any, will not have a material effect on the accompanying financial statements. Accordingly, no amounts have been provided in the accompanying financial statements for such potential claims.

1. Basis of Presentation

1. Basis of Presentation

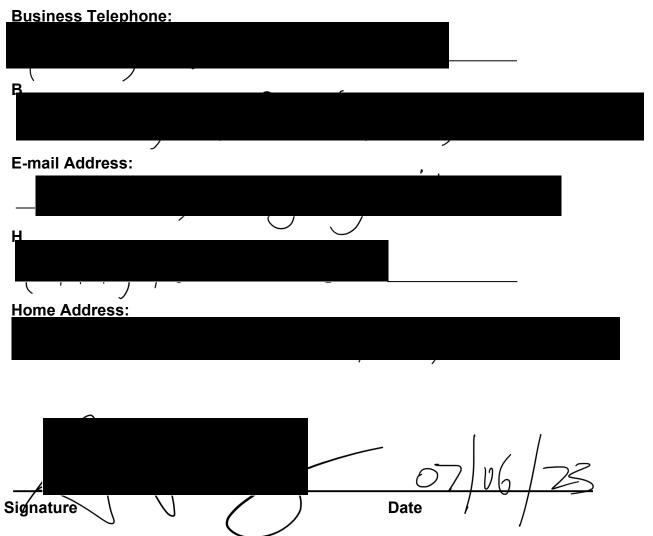

 schools that were already approved. We've also been doing outreach to families
 and elected officials in the community. They noted that we need to add someone
 with real estate experience to the board. Board members will tap their networks to
 see if we can find someone.
- Art, Pagee, Maureen, Melissa, and Chet gave an update on the status of building a strategic plan. We've engaged a number of different organizations including PWC, Columbia Business School, and Bellwether Educational Partners. Board members will be sending other recommendations
- Melissa moved to approve the nomination of Jennifer Stewart to the board. Claudia seconded. All voted to approve with no opposition

- Raul motioned to approve the budget for SY 23-24. Agatha seconded. All voted to approve with no opposition.
- Maureen motioned to approve the May 23, 2023 minutes. Angel Seconded. Claudia abstained. All others voted to approve with no opposition.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the Math, Engineering, And Science Academy Charter High School (the "School"), was held beginning at 6:00 PM local time pursuant to notice duly given.

The following Trustees were present: Arun Yang, Melissa Sexton, Maureen Ryan, Chet Mancini, Jacques Pierre, Raul Rubio, Angel Cortes, Agatha Patterson, Kym Ward Gaffney

The following trustees were absent: Claudia Granados, Aaron Campbell

Pagee Cheung, Malik Thompson, Arthur Samuels, and Cassandra Franzese were also present at the meeting.

Chet facilitated the meeting and Art recorded the minutes. All of the participants were able to speak and be heard and were deemed to be present at the meeting pursuant to the School's bylaws.

After noting that a quorum was present, Chet called the meeting to order.

- Cassandra gave an update on the school's preparation for Regents exams. - Art gave an update on the status of the 10th anniversary fundraiser. He thanked board members for their support of the event and shared ways the school is supporting board members in inviting their networks to the event.
- Art and Pagee gave an update on the process with a proposed second high school now that the charter cap has been lifted. They gave updates on the outreach to elected officials and the rationale behind the switch to CSD 20.
- The board considered the motion to ratify the email approval of the school's
 agreement to have Tugboat consulting work on the MESA 2 proposal. The proposal
 was approved by email on May 16. Angel motioned to ratify the proposal.
 Maureen seconded. All voted to approve with no opposition.
- The board considered the motion to ratify the email approval of the school's formation of MESA Links, the new related 501c3. The resolution authorizes MESA

staff to work on a volunteer basis for MESA Links, use MESA's intellectual property in the work for MESA links, and use non-public funds to fund the startup costs of MESA links.. The proposal was approved by email on May 1. Angel motioned to ratify the proposal. Raul seconded. Chet and Kym did not participate in discussion and abstained. All voted to approve with no opposition.

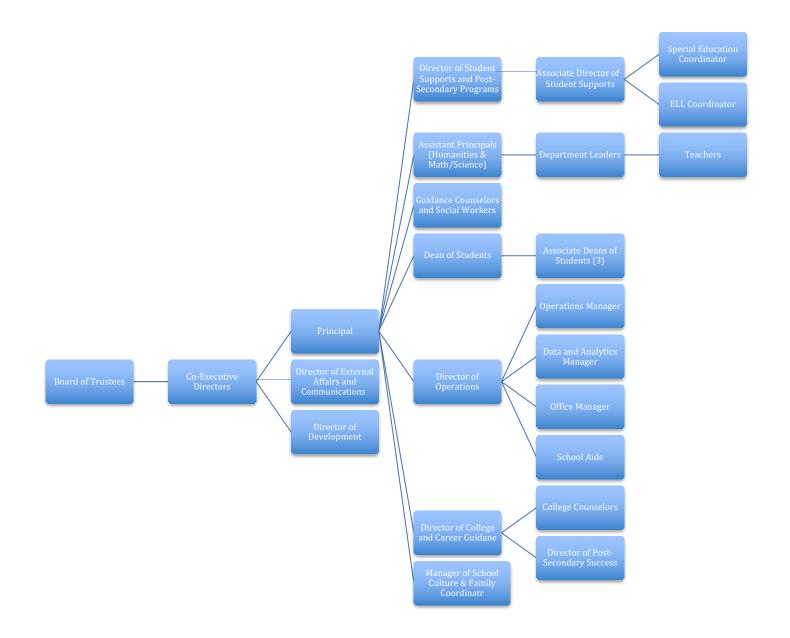
• Maureen motioned to approve the April Minutes. Melissa seconded. Agatha abstains. All others voted to approve.

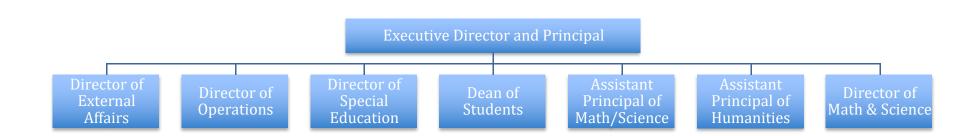
