

- Small, rural district along the Salmon River
- 1 elementary schoolApprox. 430 students Pre-K-5
- 1 middle-high school
 - Approx. 540 students 6-12
- 53% economically disadvantaged
- 5% homeless
- 16% students with disabilities
- 95% white, 2% multiracial, 2% Hispanic or Latino, and 1% Asian or Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander







The Reading Center should be a clear, defined space in your classroom with places for students to sit and read. Materials should be organized, labeled, and rotated based on the current theme. Students should be encouraged to "read" books, retell stories, and use proper book handling techniques.

The Math Center should be stocked with inviting and intriguing materials. Math manipulatives are to be put in a container with a corresponding picture label so that students can sort while they are cleaning up their area. Materials can be rotated out and a picture of a stop sign can be placed on selected bins to help students identify which bins are to be used.




The female chicken is called a hen.

Use the white balls as eggs. Create a path that will get the eggs from the top to the bottom of the "Create-a-Path Magnet Center".




