Introduction

Mathematics

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) has a partnership with NWEA for the development of the 2025 Grades 3–8 Mathematics Tests. Teachers from across the State work with NYSED in a variety of activities to ensure the validity and reliability of the New York State Testing Program (NYSTP).

The 2025 Grades 3–5 Mathematics Tests are administered in two sessions on two consecutive school days. Students will have as much time as they need each day to answer the questions in the test sessions within the confines of the regular school day.

For all three grades, the tests consist of multiple-choice and constructed-response (1-, 2-, and 3-credit) questions. Each multiple-choice question is followed by four choices, one of which is the correct answer. Students select their responses in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. The constructed-response questions require students to type (rather than select) appropriate responses in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System.

Science

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) has a partnership with NWEA Assessment Inc. for the online delivery of the 2025 Elementary-Level (Grade 5) and Intermediate-Level (Grade 8) Science Computer-Based Tests. Teachers from across the State work with NYSED in a variety of activities to ensure the validity and reliability of the New York State Testing Program (NYSTP).

The 2025 Elementary-level (Grade 5) Science Test is administered in one session. Students will have as much time as they need to answer the questions in the test session within the confines of the regular school day.

The 2025 Elementary-level Science Test contains 1-credit multiple-choice questions and 1-credit constructedresponse questions (including Technology Enhanced Items). For multiple-choice questions, students select the response that best completes the statement or answers the question from four answer choices. For the constructed-response questions, students record their answer to an open-ended question. Technology Enhanced Items (TEIs) are used to assess standards or parts of standards that cannot be adequately assessed via typical question types. They allow students to show proficiency in skills such as completing models and graphing. Students enter their responses in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. The short constructed-response questions require students to type (rather than select) appropriate responses in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System.

By following the guidelines in this document, you help ensure that the tests are valid, reliable, and equitable for all students. A series of instructions helps you organize the materials and the testing schedule.

Computer-Based Testing Make-up Dates	Make-ups must be given within the testing window listed above.**

IMPORTANT DATES

*Each district, charter, religious, or independent school will choose two consecutive school days for the primary test administration for each grade of the Mathematics test within this testing window.

- *Each district, charter, religious, or independent school will choose one school day for the primary test administration for the Elementary-level Grade 5 of the Science test within this testing window.
- **Make-ups may begin on the school day immediately following the last day of the primary test administration. Schools should be prepared and are expected to administer make-ups until the end of the administration window, regardless of school or district plans for primary administration dates.

Teachers and administrators who engage in inappropriate conduct with respect to administering and scoring State assessments may be subject to disciplinary actions in accordance with Sections 3020 and 3020-a of Education Law or to action against their certification pursuant to Part 83 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education.

STEP ONE Check Your Computer-Based Testing Materials

To administer these tests, you will need the materials listed below. If any materials are missing, notify your school principal.

For the Teacher

- Computer-Based Tests Teacher's Directions
- Student login tickets (See page 19 for step-by-step instructions on how to print student login tickets.)
- "Do Not Disturb" sign (not provided)
- Device with Internet access to monitor testing
- Session Access Code (See page 22 for instructions on where to find the Session Access Code.)
- Proctor PIN (provided by school administrator)

For Each Student—Mathematics

- School-issued student testing device prepared according to the Nextera[™] Setup and Installation Guide.
- Two sheets of scratch paper (one sheet of lined or plain paper and one sheet of graph paper) to use as scratch paper. In addition, for all test sessions, the proctor should have a further supply of scratch paper on hand to provide to students who request additional sheets during the test session.

Note: Scratch paper is considered secure material and must be collected and securely destroyed after testing.

- Reference Sheet for Grade 5

For Each Student—Science

- School-issued student testing device prepared according to the Nextera[™] Setup and Installation Guide.
- One sheet of lined ruled paper, such as loose-leaf paper, to use as scratch paper. In addition, the proctor should have on hand a further supply of scratch paper to provide to students who request additional sheets during the test.

Note: Scratch paper is considered secure material and must be collected and securely destroyed after testing.

■ No. 2 pencil with eraser (not provided)

■ A four-function calculator is provided for the Grade 5 Science Test as part of the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. Schools may continue to supply students with exclusive use of the type of handheld calculator the students use for everyday science instruction. Students taking the Grade 5 Science Test may be provided with four-function calculators with a square root key or scientific calculators.

Note: Graphing calculators are **not** permitted.

Security

The 2025 Computer-Based Tests include secure materials. School personnel responsible for testing must ensure a secure environment at all times. No section of the tests may be discussed with the students before, during, or after administration. You may, however, describe the format of the tests and the testing schedule to the students.

At no time may the contents of the test be reviewed, discussed, or shared through any electronic, printed, or any other means.

Unauthorized Materials

Students should be under close supervision at all times during the administration of the tests and may not use any unauthorized notes, printed materials, tools, or personal electronic devices that might give them an unfair advantage on the tests. When students enter the testing room, proctors must ensure that students do not bring any unauthorized materials such as those listed above.

All students are prohibited from bringing electronic devices, other than the device on which they are taking the test, into a classroom or other location where a State test is being administered. Test proctors and school officials shall retain the right to collect and hold any electronic devices, other than the device on which students are taking the test, prior to the start of the test administration.

Any student observed with any prohibited device while taking a State test must be directed to turn it over to the proctor or monitor immediately. To allow for all possible outcomes of procedural due process, the student should be allowed to complete the test. The incident must be reported promptly to the school principal. If the student had a prohibited device in their possession during the test administration, the student's test must be invalidated. No score may be calculated for that student.

The incident must be promptly reported by the principal, in writing, to the Office of State Assessment (OSA) by fax at 518-474-1989 or by <u>email</u> (emscassessinfo@nysed.gov), as is the case for all student-related testing irregularities, misadministrations, or other violations of State testing policy and procedures.

Note: Some students with disabilities may use certain recording/playback devices only if this accommodation is specifically required as a provision of the student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) or Section 504 Accommodation Plan (504 Plan). In addition, a student may be allowed to retain an otherwise prohibited personal device in their possession if there is documentation on file at the school from a medical practitioner that the student requires such a device during testing. Without this documentation, the general policy on communications devices as provided above is in effect, and the school may not allow the student to retain any such equipment while testing.

Aid to Students

Teachers may give students assistance only in the mechanics of taking the test, such as understanding access and navigation of the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System, or that their responses must be entered into the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. No one, under any circumstances, may interpret or explain test questions to students, nor may anyone review or comment to a student about the correctness or sufficiency of the student's response while the test is in progress. In response to inquiries by students concerning the meaning or interpretation of test questions, proctors should advise students to use their own best judgment.

Temporary Absence from Testing Room

No student may be permitted to leave and then return to the testing room during the test session unless the student is accompanied by a proctor for the duration of their absence from the testing room. Information on "Pausing and Reactivating a Computer-Based Test in Nextera[™] Test Delivery System," should it be necessary, can be found in **Appendix B** of these directions.

Emergency Evacuation of a School Building

Evacuation of a school building during a test may be required because of an emergency such as a fire alarm or bomb threat. In any situation in which the safety of the students is endangered, the principal has full authority to interrupt the test immediately. If it is possible, the students should be kept under supervision during the emergency. Then, when work can be resumed safely, allow the students the necessary time to complete the test. Following the test, a written report of the circumstances should be sent by mail or fax to OSA. (See the section "Reporting Irregularities and/or Misadministrations" in the <u>School Administrator's Manual</u> [https://www.nysed.gov/state-assessment/grades-3-8-ela-math-and-science-test-manuals]).

Student Cheating

Do not permit students to obtain information from or give information to other students in any way during the tests. If you suspect that such an attempt has occurred, warn the students that any further attempts will result in the termination of their test. If necessary, move the students to another location. If these steps fail to end attempts to obtain or give information, notify the principal immediately and terminate the students' tests. At the conclusion of the test session, all suspected cheating must be reported to the principal.

Illness

If a student becomes ill during a session of the test, the student should be excused until the student is well enough to continue. When the student is well enough to complete the test (as long as the test administration window has not ended), the student may be given the remaining part of the test. Other unadministered sessions of the test should also be administered according to these directions as long as the test administration window has not ended. When a student is taking a partially completed session of the test, that student must be closely supervised so that they do not go back to previously completed questions on the test. (See **Appendix B** for guidance on how to reactivate a paused test.)

Proctoring

Proctors must circulate periodically around the room during the administration of the tests to ensure that students are working independently and recording their responses to test questions in the proper manner and in the proper place. While circulating around the room, proctors should support students in the mechanics of taking the tests and ensure a secure environment is maintained. Proctors should review the **Review screen** with the student to ensure the student has answered all of the questions before the student selects **Submit Test.** Proctors may not comment to the student on the correctness or sufficiency of any answer. Proctors should not use their own personal communication devices during the test, unless an emergency situation arises.

Note: The proctor need not be concerned if a student submits the test without having first shown the Review screen to the proctor.

Misadministration

Notify your principal immediately if any session of the test is administered improperly. Examples of misadministration include the following: permitting students to have unauthorized testing accommodations or tools or engaging in other types of nonstandard test administration (for example, cheating). (See the section "Reporting Irregularities and/or Misadministrations" in the <u>School Administrator's Manual</u> [https:// www.nysed.gov/state-assessment/grades-3-8-ela-math-and-science-test-manuals]).

STEP TWO Plan Your Computer-Based Testing Schedule

- Schedule testing to allow sufficient time for instructions and preparations. Plan to read instructions to students at a moderate, steady pace.
- Read the 2025 Computer-Based Tests Teacher's Directions in its entirety prior to administering the test.
- Review Step Six, "Administer the Test," before administering each session of the test. Refer to the "Table of Contents" to locate the appropriate test directions for your grade and test session.
- Plan to have school technical support available during testing, including contact information if staff is not available to be in the testing room.
- Avoid testing just after students have had strenuous physical activity.

Mathematics Test Format and Schedule

The 2025 Grades 3–5 Mathematics Computer-Based Tests each consist of two sessions: Session 1 and Session 2, administered on two consecutive school days. Session 1 contains multiple-choice questions only. Session 2 contains multiple-choice and constructed-response questions.

In Spring 2012, in order to have the data obtained from field test questions better reflect students' level of understanding, New York State began embedding multiple-choice questions for field testing within the operational tests. For 2025, the embedded questions will occur in Session 1. This means that field test questions will be interspersed with operational test questions in this session. The field test questions will not count toward the student's final score, but will be used to collect valuable information on how well the questions perform and for possible inclusion on future operational tests. Students will not know whether a question is a field test question that does not count toward their score or an operational test question that does count toward their score.

Each multiple-choice question is followed by four choices, one of which is the correct answer. Students select their responses to the multiple-choice questions in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. Session 2 contains multiple-choice questions and constructed-response questions. Preceding each constructed-response question is a statement that indicates the number of credits a correct response receives. For example, for a 2-credit constructed-response question it will state, "This question is worth 2 credits." The constructed-response questions require students to type appropriate responses in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System.

Each student testing in Grade 5 mathematics will have a mathematics reference sheet for their exclusive use during each test session. The mathematics reference sheet is available in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. Your school has also been provided with printed copies of the mathematics reference sheet, which should be distributed to each student prior to each test session. All printed mathematics reference sheets must be collected after each test session and returned to the school administrator.

Students who finish the test before other students should check their work. When the student is ready, the test responses must be submitted by the student in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. After a student's test responses are submitted, that student may be permitted to read silently. This privilege is granted at the discretion of each school. No talking and no other schoolwork is permitted. Once all students complete and submit the test, you may end the session.

For the Spring 2025 tests, there are no time limits. The table below provides an estimated time it will take students to complete each session.

	Estimated Time to Complete Session 1	Estimated Time to Complete Session 2
Grade 3	55–65 Minutes	60–70 Minutes
Grade 4	65–75 Minutes	65–75 Minutes
Grade 5	80–90 Minutes	70–80 Minutes

These time estimates above are for planning purposes only. Please plan accordingly to allow students to complete the test at their own pace. All students who are productively working should be allowed to complete the test, within the confines of the regular school day, regardless of the time estimates listed above. Students should be productively engaged in completing assessments and not be retained beyond that point. School personnel should use their best professional judgment and knowledge about individual students to determine how long a student should be engaged in taking a particular assessment and when it is in the student's best interest to release them.

Science Test Format and Schedule

The 2025 Elementary-level (Grade 5) Science Test (ELS) contains 1-credit multiple-choice questions and 1-credit constructed-response questions (including Technology Enhanced Items). For multiple-choice questions, students select the response that best completes the statement or answers the question from four answer choices. For the constructed-response questions, students record their answer to an open-ended question. Technology Enhanced Items (TEIs) are used to assess standards or parts of standards that cannot be adequately assessed via typical question types. They allow students to show proficiency in skills such as completing models and graphing. To preview this functionality, go to the <u>Question Sampler</u> (https://ny.nextera.questarai.com/tds/#practice).

The 2025 Elementary-level Science Test consists of a single session that is administered in one day (Grades 3–8 Test Schedules, https://www.nysed.gov/state-assessment/grades-3-8-test-schedules). Students will be provided as much time as necessary within the confines of the regular school day to complete the test. School personnel should use their best professional judgment and knowledge about individual students to determine how long a student should be engaged in taking a particular assessment and when it is in the student's best interest to end the test session.

For planning purposes, schools should allocate a <u>minimum</u> of 90 minutes for the administration of the ELS test. This information is intended for test preparation and planning only, as test duration will vary among students. Educators are strongly encouraged to share this information with students and parents prior to test administration. The tests must be administered under standard conditions and the directions must be followed carefully. The same test administration procedures must be used with all students so that valid inferences can be drawn from the test results.

The chart below illustrates the test design for the 2025 Elementary-level Science Test. Approximately 60 percent of each test will be comprised of multiple-choice questions, while approximately 40 percent will be constructed-response questions (including Technology Enhanced Items). Embedded field test questions are included in the number of questions below. It will not be apparent to students whether a question is an embedded field test question that does not count toward their score or an operational test question that does count toward their score. There will be variation in the number of questions that make up each cluster depending upon the assessment storyline; as a result, there may be slight variation in the total number of exam questions from year to year. Students who finish the test before other students should check their work. When a student is ready, the test must be submitted by the student in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. After a student's test responses are submitted, that student may be permitted to read silently. This privilege is granted at the discretion of each school. No talking and no other schoolwork are permitted. Once all students complete and submit the test, you may end the session.

Testing Accommodations for Students with IEPs and 504 Plans

In general, students with disabilities must be provided with the testing accommodations specified in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) and Section 504 Accommodation Plans (504 Plans) when taking these tests. However, testing accommodations that change the constructs, or what a test is measuring, are not permitted on elementary- and intermediate-level State tests. In administering the 2025 tests to students with disabilities, schools should follow the guidelines on testing accommodations provided in the <u>School Administrator's Manual</u> (https://www.nysed.gov/state-assessment/grades-3-8-ela-math-and-science-test-manuals).

Test Read

Both sessions of the test may be read to students whose IEPs or 504 Plans include this accommodation. More detailed information about this accommodation can be found in the Office of Special Education's *Testing Accommodations for Students with Disabilities Guidance Document* (https://www.nysed.gov/special-education/testing-accommodations-students-disabilities-policy-and-tools-guide).


Read Aloud (by human): For the 2025 Computer-Based Tests, the Read Aloud (by human) accommodation is available for students testing on the computer. The Read Aloud (by human) accommodation indicates that all student directions, questions, and multiple-choice answer choices will be read aloud by the teacher, except where otherwise indicated within the student's IEP or 504 Plan.

Text-to-Speech (TTS): For the 2025 Grades 3–8 Computer-Based Tests, the text-to-speech (TTS) accommodation is available for students. For math, the TTS accommodation will read all student directions, questions, and multiple-choice answers. For science, the TTS accommodation will read all student directions, passages, questions, and multiple-choice answers options. Students who have been identified as having the accommodation of TTS will see a toolbar when they have logged into the test. The following options are available to them:


- 1. Play All
- 2. Play Question
- 3. Play Answers
- 4. Speed Option



Please note: For Grade 5 Math only, the TTS accommodation has an additional option. If a user clicks on the reference sheet icon on the tool bar, then the TTS option reference sheet will display. The TTS accommodation will read the reference sheet for the student if this option in the drop-down menu is chosen.



Additionally, if a student wants to hear only a portion of the question or the answer options, the student can place the cursor where they want the TTS to begin, right click, and select "Play From Here."



Note: Text-to-Speech (TTS) requires an Internet connection. If the Internet connection is lost, TTS will be unavailable until the Internet connection is restored. Once restored, TTS functionality will resume.

Use of Scribes

The use of scribes is an allowable accommodation for the 2025 Computer-Based Tests. More detailed information about the procedures to follow for the use of scribes may be found in the <u>School Administrator's Manual</u> (https://www.nysed.gov/state-assessment/grades-3-8-ela-math-and-science-test-manuals).

Use of Calculators and Other Devices

Students whose IEPs or 504 Plans specify the use of counting blocks, counters, or an abacus are permitted to use such devices for all sessions associated with the 2025 Computer-Based Grades 3-8 Mathematics Tests and Elementary-level (Grade 5) and Intermediate-level (Grade 8) Science Tests.

Mathematics

Grades 3–5

Because the 2025 Grades 3–5 Mathematics Tests measure students' proficiencies involving calculations, the use of a calculator or mathematics tables is **not** allowed.

Science

Calculators will be available for students in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. Schools may continue to supply students with exclusive use of the type of hand-held calculator the students use for everyday science instruction.

Grade 5

Students should have exclusive use of a four function calculator for the Grade 5 Science test. Students taking the Grade 5 Science Test may be provided with a four-function calculator with a square root key or scientific calculator. Graphing calculators are **not** permitted. The use of mathematics tables is permitted for the Science test if specified in a student's IEP or 504 Plan.

When students enter the testing room, clear, reset, or disable the memory of any hand-held calculator with programming capability. If the memory of a student's calculator is password-protected and cannot be cleared, the calculator must not be used. Students may not use calculators that are capable of symbol manipulation or that can communicate with other calculators, nor may students use operating manuals, instruction or formula cards, or other information concerning the operation of calculators during the tests.



*Please note that students with accommodations who are taking the test on paper per an IEP or a 504 plan or English Language Learners who are testing on paper must take both sessions of the test on paper and should not switch between CBT and PBT format between sessions.

Computer-Based Testing Accommodations

The Nextera[™] Test Delivery System includes the following Computer-Based Testing (CBT) accommodations:

- Answer Masking Tool
- Initial Page Zoom
- Text-to-Speech (TTS, online only)
- Read Aloud (by human)

General Features and Tools of the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System

All students testing on computer have access to general tools and features that are available through the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. These can help to enhance their test-taking experience. Some features can help the student make adjustments to the test-taking environment, such as the zoom tool, which helps students to enlarge or minimize text. Other tools help to enhance their test-taking strategies, such as highlighters and answer eliminators. As with the paper-based tests, certain tools for students who are testing in Math and Science are only available for specific grades and test sessions (e.g., calculators and protractors). Please refer to **Appendix D: General Features and Tools of the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System** for additional information on the testing tools available to students for computer-based testing.

STEP THREE Prepare Your Computer-Based Testing Room

- Plan for the distribution and collection of materials.
- Provide a well-lit, well-ventilated, and quiet testing room.
- Each student will need their own school-issued device that has been configured for testing. Please work with your school administrator to verify the devices are ready for testing. The Nextera[™] Setup and Installation Guide has detailed instructions for setting up devices for testing.
- Plan seating arrangements. Allow enough space between students to prevent sharing of answers. To help prevent communication between students during testing, make sure that each student is clearly visible to the proctor at all times. Students must not be permitted to speak to one another while the tests are being administered. For additional Suggestions for Creating a Secure Computer-Based Testing Environment, see Appendix A.
- A seating chart is recommended in the event that the Internet fails and a student needs to go back to a certain device to submit their test at a later time.
- Eliminate distractions such as bells or telephones.
- Completely cover or remove from the walls mathematics aids or charts and all board work pertaining to mathematics. This includes any such materials that pertain to the New York State computer-based testing system tools.
- Place a "Do Not Disturb" sign on the door of the testing room.
- Make sure students' work spaces are cleared of all unauthorized materials.

STEP FOUR Prepare Your Students

- Help students approach the testing in a relaxed, positive way.
- Explain that the purpose of taking these tests is to find out which concepts have been mastered and which need further development.
- Point out that some questions may be more difficult than others and that, for constructed-response questions, partial credit may be given. Encourage and motivate your students to put forth their best effort.
- Be sure students understand the directions and have had the opportunity to practice using the Practice Tests, which can be accessed through the Questar Secure Browser or on the web-based <u>Question Sampler</u> (https://ny.nextera.questarai.com/tds/#practice).
- Assist students with test-taking procedures, but be careful not to inadvertently give hints or clues that indicate an answer or help eliminate answer choices. Do not assist students with any test questions.
- Encourage students to attempt all questions. Tell them to read each question carefully and make their best attempt at answering each one.

Practice Tests

Prior to the test window opening, all students taking the 2025 Computer-Based Tests should have experienced taking practice tests in the Questar Secure Browser, or on the web-based <u>Question Sampler</u> (https://ny.nextera.questarai.com/tds/#practice) to familiarize themselves with testing in this format. It is recommended that schools participating in computer-based testing set up time in February and March to get students accustomed to taking the test on the computer.

Use Standardized Testing Procedures

This test must be administered under standard conditions. Follow the directions carefully. The same test administration procedures must be used with all students so that valid conclusions can be drawn from the test results.

STEP FIVE Prepare Computer-Based Testing Materials

Scratch Paper

Schools that will be administering the Mathematics and Science Tests with Computer-Based Testing (CBT) should prepare to furnish scratch paper to their students for use when taking the tests. At the start of each test session the proctor should hand out scratch paper to each student testing on computer. For the Grades 3–5 Mathematics Tests, each student should be given two sheets of scratch paper (one sheet of lined or plain paper and one sheet of graph paper). For the Elementary-Level Grade 5 Science Test, each student should be given one sheet of lined ruled paper, such as loose-leaf paper, to use as scratch paper. In addition, for all test sessions the proctor should have a further supply of scratch paper on hand to provide to students who request additional sheets during the test session. Students testing on computer should also be advised that any work done on this scratch paper will not be counted. The scratch paper distributed to students testing on computer must be collected at the end of the session, whether used or unused, and securely destroyed.

Student Login Tickets

Teachers will need student login tickets for each student to sign in with, a Session Access Code for each test session, and a Proctor PIN for students who may need to pause the test. The information that follows provides step-by-step instructions on how to retrieve this information from Nextera[™] Admin.

For each student in your class, verify that you have the correct student login tickets. If you are printing the login tickets for your class, follow the steps below.

1. Sign in to Nextera[™] Admin. For further details on the login process, refer to **Appendix C** for step-by-step instructions to sign in and sign out.



Please read these directions carefully before administering the tests. When you administer the tests, the directions you are to read aloud are preceded by **SAY**. Read all directions to students at a moderate, steady pace. The italicized instructions to teachers should **not** be read aloud.

Grades 3–5—Day 1, Session 1

Before you begin the test:

For Grades 3–5:

- Make sure you have the student login tickets for each student, the Session Access Code, and the Proctor PIN.
- Make sure you have scratch paper for each student (one sheet of lined or plain paper and one sheet of graph paper).

For Grade 5 only

■ Make sure you have a printed mathematics reference sheet for each student. The mathematics reference sheet is also available in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System.

At the beginning of the test administration, proctors must read the following statement to all students taking State tests:

- SAY You cannot have any communications device, other than the device on which you are taking the test, including a cell phone, with you during this test or during any breaks, such as a restroom visit. Such devices include, but are not limited to:

 - iPods and MP3 players
 - iPads, tablets, and other eReaders

You may not keep your cell phone or any of these items with you, or near you, including in your pockets, backpack, desk, etc. If you keep a cell phone or any of these items with you, your examination will be invalidated and you will get no score. Is there anyone who needs to give me any of these items now?

This is your last opportunity to do so before the test begins.

Repeat list of devices. Pick up devices from students and return them after testing.

SAY You will be taking the 2025 [say appropriate grade] Mathematics Test. There are two sessions for this test. Today, you will answer the questions in Session 1. Tomorrow, you will answer the questions in Session 2.

This test gives you a chance to show your teachers what you have learned in Mathematics this year. The test will not affect your classroom grade. Your school uses the results of the test to make sure you have the support you need to succeed. Please try your best.

If any of the information is not correct, please raise your hand. You do not need to verify your NYSSIS ID.

If the student information is incorrect, check to be sure the student has the correct login ticket.

If the date of birth or teacher's name is incorrect, or the student's name is misspelled, document the error and notify the School Test Coordinator after the test session has ended. The student should begin testing and the error can be corrected at a later time.

If the grade is incorrect, the student should not continue the login process. The student should click "No" and log out of the secure browser. Notify the School Test Coordinator or District Test Coordinator as soon as it is feasible to do so. The School Test Coordinator or District Test Coordinator will need to go in to Nextera[™] Admin and correct the grade level for the student. The student will then get a new login ticket in order to begin testing. If the student sees the wrong grade on this screen, they will be presented with the wrong test.

Appendices

Appendix A: Suggestions for Creating a Secure Computer-Based Testing Environment

The following seating arrangements are suggestions for creating a secure test environment for students who are taking the computer-based tests.

- Seat students in every other seat.
- Arrange monitors back-to-back.
- Seat students back-to-back.
- Seat students in a semicircle.
- Seat students in widely-spaced rows or in every other row.

The following physical and visual barriers between testing devices can also be used as security measures for computer-based testing.

- Card stock (e.g., manila folders) that can be taped to the sides of monitors
- Flattened cardboard boxes that can be cut, folded, and taped to form a visual barrier between testing devices
- Cardboard carrels
- Privacy screens that narrow the viewing angle of a computer monitor so that it is visible only to someone sitting in front of it. Schools that have privacy screens available should affix them to monitors prior to the beginning of testing and ensure that students are seated so that they cannot view the monitor of the student seated in the row in front of them.

Appendix B: Pausing and Reactivating a Computer-Based Test in Nextera[™] Test Delivery System

A student may pause a test by selecting **II/Sign Out** in the upper right corner of the student's screen in the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System.



The student then selects **Pause test** to exit the test session and save current progress until the student can return to the test session. If the student selects **Cancel**, the student will immediately return to the test session without pausing the test.





Online/Offline Indicator, Directions, and Pause/Sign Out



- The Online/Offline Indicator in the upper left of the screen indicates whether a student's device has or has not lost Internet connectivity. Students should be informed to continue testing even if they lose Internet connectivity as their responses will be saved to their local device. In an event where Internet connectivity is not restored, please contact NWEA Customer Support for assistance at 866-997-0695.
- The student can click on the **Directions** link in the upper right of the screen to see the directions again at any point during the test.
- The student can click on the Pause/Sign Out button in the upper right to pause and sign out of the test without submitting their answers. For additional information on pausing and reactivating a test, see Appendix B.



- The right and left arrows on the upper right of the screen are used to move between different questions on the test. The right facing arrow advances the student forward. The left facing arrow takes the student to the previous question.


Zoom, Bookmark, and Note (Notepad)



These general computer-based testing tools can be used any time during the test.

- Zoom—Students can increase and decrease font size. Clicking on the minus button makes the screen smaller. Clicking the plus button makes it larger. Note that if students click the reset button within the zoom tool, the text will return to the original setting.
- Bookmark—Students can press the bookmark in the tool tray to flag questions they want to return to at a later time. Bookmarked questions appear on the Review screen with a flag on them.
- Note (Notepad)—Students can use the Notepad to plan their responses. Please ensure that your students understand that text they type in the notepad tool will not be scored. Once the test is submitted, notepad text is not saved.

Color choices, Answer eliminator, Highlighter, and Line-reader



The following tools can help students to highlight or focus on certain text or eliminate multiple-choice answers. When using any of the following tools, a student must deactivate the currently active tool before using another.

- Reference Sheet—For Mathematics only, students in Grade 5 have access to the mathematics reference sheet provided within the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System. For Grade 5 there are two ways to access the reference sheet on the computer: A student can either click the Reference button on the tool tray or click the Reference button on the Review screen. Note that some students may prefer to use a printed copy, which must also be provided to them. Schools will receive these copies in their shipment of secure materials.
- Calculator—For Science only, students can use either the hand-held four-function calculator with a square root key or scientific calculator provided by the school or the four-function calculator available within the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System to help students answer questions on the test.

Students can access the calculator by clicking on the calculator button on the tool tray. Note that graphing calculators are **not** permitted.

- Highlighter—Students can use the highlighter tool to identify part of the test for emphasis. To clear highlighted text, click on the highlighted text a second time while the tool is active.
- Answer Eliminator—Students can eliminate multiple-choice answers they think are incorrect by clicking the answer eliminator on the tool tray. When this tool is on, a student can click on the answers they want to be crossed out. Note that the answer eliminator is only available for multiple-choice questions.
- Ruler and Protractor—Students can use the ruler and protractor available within the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System to help them solve problems on the test. Rulers are available within the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System for Grades 3–5. Protractors are available within the Nextera[™] Test Delivery System for Grades 4–5. Students can access both the ruler and protractor by clicking on the ruler or protractor button on the tool tray.
- Line Reader—Students can use the line reader to block certain parts of the text so a student can focus on one portion at a time by clicking on the line reader tool in the tool tray. Students can use the window to focus on the text they want to see and the opaque portion around the window to block out what they don't want to see. Both the window and opaque portions can be resized.
- Color Choices—Students can use the Color Choices tool to choose among various background colors and text options: blue, green, pink, or yellow background with black text, or reverse contrast with white text and a black background. Please note that some images may be best viewed in black text. When using reverse contrast, students have the opportunity to switch the modal from reverse contrast to black text with a white background if the student needs confirmation or clarification of the details of an image.

Appendix E: Troubleshooting

Printing Student Login Tickets

If you selected Avery5160 or Avery5163 from the dropdown and are attempting to print student login tickets on label stock, try the following steps if the student login tickets are not aligning properly with the labels:

- 1. Save the .pdf file
- 2. Find the .pdf on your local drive and open it
- 3. Select File, then select Print
- 4. Select "Custom Scale: 100%"
- 5. Verify paper size is 8.5 x 11 Inches
- 6. Select Print

Issues During Testing

- A concurrent login occurs when a student attempts to log in with credentials that are already in use. Potential causes of a concurrent login are:
 - A student who was actively testing on a device that malfunctioned or lost power before they were able to log out and then attempts to log in on a new device with their same credentials to continue testing.
 - A mistake is made when distributing the printed login tickets and two or more students are given the same login credentials. The student will receive a warning message stating, "This account has been signed in on another device, and only one sign in can be active at a time." Contact your Principal, DTC, STC, or RIC for further guidance.
- If the screen freezes, sign in takes longer than one minute, or test load takes longer than one minute, try exiting the test and signing back in. A reboot may be necessary.
- If the device is permanently incapacitated, or if network connectivity is lost for an extended period of time, please contact the School Test Coordinator. The School Test Coordinator can contact NWEA Customer Support, if needed.
- Chromebooks—If a student clicks on the Exit button at the lower left portion of the screen, they will exit the test and the secure browser. The student will need to sign in again and continue testing.
- Lost Internet connectivity—If network connectivity is lost during the test, the student should continue to test. DO NOT move the student to another device. The device will continue trying to reconnect indefinitely to upload the test responses. Please note that the student must return to the same device that they began testing on to submit their test once the Internet connectivity has been reestablished.

Note: Text-to-Speech (TTS) requires an Internet connection. If the Internet connection is lost, TTS will be unavailable until the Internet connection is restored. Once restored, TTS functionality will resume.

If attempts to reestablish Internet connectivity are unsuccessful, follow the applicable steps from the table below:
