Title I Parent and Family Engagement

What is Family Engagement?

Family Engagement means the participation of parents and family members in regular, twoway, and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring:

- (A) That parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning.
- (B) That parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education.
- (C) That parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision-making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child.
- (D) The carrying out of other activities, such as those described in Section 1116 of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).



Why is it Important?

When families are involved, students:

- Earn higher grades
- Attend school more regularly
- Enjoy school more and behave better
- Are more likely to go on to postsecondary education or having successful careers



Requirements Under Title I, Part A

- Local Educational Agency Policy (LEA or District)
 - Written Policy
 - Build capacity of participating schools
 - Coordination of technical assistance
 - Jointly Developed
 - Distributed to parents and family members of participating children
- Parent and Family member input in how funds are allotted for this purpose
- School Level Policy
 - Shared Responsibilities for High Student Academic Achievement
 - School-parent compact
 - Building Capacity for Involvement



Requirements Under Title I, Part A, continued

- Annual Parent Meeting
 - Explains the requirements of parent and family engagement
- Parents Right to Know
 - Parents may request professional qualifications of classroom teachers
 - The LEA will provide information on student's level of achievement and academic growth on State Assessments
